Associated Country Women of the World ACWW is the only international organization representing country women and homemakers. It links together many societies with a membership of approximately nine million women in over 70 countries and is the channel through which members in different parts of the world share information. All societies or

groups are non-party, non-racial, and nonsectarian. Together they work (1) to raise the standard of living of rural women by providing classes for economic growth projects, (2) to provide education to help women learn the importance of good sanitation, adequate nutrition and health care for their families, (3) to promote international friendship and understanding, and (4) to be a voice for country women in international matters.

From the 1930's through the 2000 decade, FCE's mission to strengthen families through continuing education, leadership development and community action has remained the same. Leadership through education is the key; volunteerism is the means. FCE's mission – past, present and future – connects with families. FCE has looked into the future to empower women to change their lives, their families and their communities for the better.
