The Treasurers Bottom Line

This past year at Spring Board meeting the board discussed the cost of the newsletter. For many years we have been taking a little over \$400 per year out of the Education Fund and the same amount out of the Enhancement Fund to finance our Oregon FCE Newsletter. While that doesn't sound like a huge amount over 10 years that is well over \$4000 out of each account. That amount, along with the other expenses we take out of the two funds, will seriously deplete those accounts as we are only making about \$12.00 interest in each of our CDs per year.

None of us want to see the newsletter go away, and many do not want to receive the newsletter via email or download it from the website. As a board the decision was made to try asking for a donation from each member to help finance the newsletter. I'm pleased to say that we have had a good response from our members. Many donated to the newsletter fund and the fund for the website. I do not have all of the membership forms in at this time so I do not have a final figure for the donations. Also just a plea to the County Treasurers, if your members donated to either the newsletter or the website funds, or both, please send the money in to me very soon so I can get an accurate accounting. Also, if you weren't able to donate when you paid your dues, but would like to do so now, you can send a check directly to the Oregon FCE Treasurer, note what the donation is for, and it will be credited to that fund.

Last fall at the Oregon FCE Annual Conference we talked with many of you about some ideas we could implement that could help improve our bottom line. We have tried various fund raising projects with the sale of T-shirts and sweatshirts, vests and more recently the bling FCE bags. While we haven't LOST money with these projects, they haven't been as lucrative as we had hoped.

Many of you have been to antique and collectible malls, and know that people set up in the malls to sell various items. Klamath County FCE has had a booth in Keepers Corner (an antique, craft and collectible mall) for a few years and has been doing very well sales wise. Keepers Corner donates the cost of the booth space so all of the money earned is profit.

A booth has now been set up at Keepers Corner in Klamath Falls to sell items for Oregon FCE. The first month was only a partial month and sales were only \$35.85, the next month was \$97.90, and the sales were \$133.75 for December. That is a total of\$266.35! While it isn't a huge amount of money right now, it has the potential of bringing the organization several hundred dollars a year. It all helps the bottom line! We realize that this is quite a distance to get items to Klamath Falls for some of you, but we will try to make this work! Ideas for items that sell well in the store are household items such as antique or collectible glassware, Pyrex bowls, wall décor, table top décor, lamps, doily's etc. Other items that sell well are "new" crocheted or knitted dish cloths, decorated hand towels, seasonal decorations and good used books. When determining items to put in the booth a good rule of thumb is: If it is something you would buy for your own home then it will more than likely sell in the store. If it is chipped, cracked, torn, or damaged in anyway, it will not be anything that will sell.

We are always interested in how you raise money, what you use the money for and what kind of volunteering you do. Here are some of the wonderful things our members are doing:

Raising money for 4H scholarships through collecting bottles and cans.

HEATING WITH COAL

It is not surprising that in the 1940's most of the houses in Salt Lake City heated with coal. For Utah is a desert country and has more coal than wood in its hills.

Most of the houses at that time had basements. There was usually a metal door in the foundation of the house that was for the coal to be delivered by a dump truck. The gravel sized coal was shoveled down a chute to the "coal room". By experience one quickly learned that the door to the coal room should be tightly closed when the delivery arrived -- for coal was dusty.

The coal room had a "stoker" -- a hopper-- that fed the coal into the furnace. Ashes and clinkers had to routinely be cleaned from the furnace. This was done with a flat shovel and the clinkers removed with a long rod that had movable tongs on the end. (I remember papa manipulating the tongs and me thinking it was like when grandpa pulled the tendons of a turkey's claw.) The ashes were stored in a metal can and were set out with the garbage to be picked up.

Grandma had a wood stove that burned coal. Once her fire was going, she stoked the fire with coal she kept by the stove in a scuttle. (a lipped bucket).

Coal kept us warm. but it polluted. We lived up

on the "East Bench" --one of the bathtub rings left by ancient Lake Bonneville. In the winter we could always see a layer of dirty haze in the valley below us.

Come spring time, house cleaning was a ceiling to floor project. It was tedious work to remove the accumulated grime. Wall paper cleaner--a pliable pink putty that was used to erase the coal smudged walls.
