District and Study Group Reports

District I Rural Dell Wildcat FCE Study Group Ann Clites

Study group member Elaine Daniels, in going through records and files of her late mother-in-law Roberta Daniels, found the minutes from the very first meetings in the 1930's through meetings in the 1980's of a local group of women whose club became what is now known as the Rural Dell/Wildcat FCE Study Group.

On Nov. 30, 1932 six women met for the purpose of organizing a neighborhood club. They called themselves the "Rural Dell Women's Club". It was decided that refreshments be limited to "two things and a beverage." The By-Laws stated that "all members shall wear a wash dress to the meetings and members shall call each other by their given name." Club meetings were often held in the community hall and the Club answered the call to give the building a good cleaning.

The group focused on the needs of the Rural Dell School children and school facilities.

In December of 1932 arrangements were made with Miss Thelma Gaylord, county demonstration agent, to present a lesson at one meeting a month. Thus began the club's connection to OSU's Extension Services program.

The meetings in 1938 included lessons such as "Possible arrangements of furniture According to Use and Balance", "Dessert Demonstration", "Choosing Curtains and Draperies", and "Furniture Arrangement with Emphasis on Lighting".

Fast forward to the extension lessons of 1983 to see how times changed.... Lessons included "Spud Savvy", "Speed Sewing", "Earning Money at Home," "Mexican Luncheon and Culture," "Portable Edibles," "Handling Conflicts Creatively," "Simple Home Repairs," "Housing Alternatives for the Elderly," "Health in Your Life", "Oregon Women in History."

Rural Dell Women's Club contributed annually to 4-H scholarships and made significant annual contributions to the OSU Foundation. From its beginnings the Rural Dell Women's Club exemplified community spirit through service and their desire to keep up-to-date with what is called today "family and consumer sciences". The Rural Dell Wildcat FCE Study Group has a proud history of being connected to OSU Extension Service for almost 90 years.

District III Anne Engen, Director

We have 3 active Study Groups, <u>Lost Creek</u> south of Eugene, <u>Amity Study Group</u>, and the <u>Creative Homemakers</u> in McMinnville. Each group was represented at the National Conference, with 6 full time attendees, and one coming for just a day.

I started with my great grandmother, **Phibe Ann Pine Northrup**, who came west on the Oregon Trail, bore 9 babies in 12 years, buried 3 of them and died at age 29 years nine years 9 months. Next came Abigail Scott Duniway who fought for women's rights, portrayed by Sally Wyffels. Next came Bethenia Owens-Adair first woman doctor in Oregon, then Sarah Winnemucca, interpreter, speaker, author, who's statue is in the rotunda in Washington DC. Ann Conklin portrayed Minnie Mae Mossman Hill the first female steamboat captain west of the Mississippi. Lola Green **Baldwin** who made men listen, 1st female police woman sworn in April 1, 1908, Maurine Neuberger who as the only woman in the Oregon house took on the powerful Dairy industry portrayed by Lynda Nyseth, and Beverly Bunn Cleary who wrote popular children's books set in northeast Portland. She was portrayed by Bonnie Teeples. I spent hours researching these women and writing their stories.

June 14 the Amity group held a FCE Day of Fun, inviting all the study groups and friends. They played hilarious games, ate sandwiches for lunch, taco salad for dinner, colored cards to save or send to a nursing home to give clients on their birthdays.

Our next District event (happening just before this newsletter comes out), is **August 17** when we gather at Millersburg's park for a potluck and games. It's about halfway in our long skinny District.

District V Prospect Study Group Karen Baker
